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FUNDING PRIORITIES FOR P-12 AND HIGHER EDUCATION

Governor Janet T. Mills presented a budget for Fiscal Year 2022-2023 that would “[make] a historic investment in Maine public schools and [meet] the State’s obligation to pay 55 percent of the cost of K-12 education for the first time in Maine’s history.”¹ About one week later, the act to meet the obligation of paying 55 percent of education costs failed in the legislature.² Alternatively, consistent with the Commissioner’s School Funding Recommendation for FY 2021 presented to the Maine State Board of Education,³ “a minimum teacher salary of \$37,500 for school year 2022”⁴ passed at the statehouse, thrusting Career and Technical Education teachers forward in the minimum \$40,000 salary initiative.⁵ In the latest regular legislative session, constituents prioritized academic gains. The state department has been directed to analyze funding to address student achievement gaps.⁶

CHANGES TO THE FUNDING FORMULA FOR P-12 EDUCATION

Part foundation formula and part resource-allocation (EPS), Maine’s funding structure continues to be a work in progress. Although the explicit pursuit of providing for “equitable funding” at the statehouse was unsuccessful,⁷ the legislature recognized the need to stabilize student enrollment count in the school funding formula.⁸ Language addressed how to calculate student enrollment for specific districts, detailing that if enrollment was the same or increased, to average the two most recent years; and that if enrollment decreased greater than 10%, to average the last three most recent years.

PRESSING STATE ISSUES AFFECTING P-12 AND HIGHER EDUCATION FUNDING

The Governor has continued the use of federal funding to increase broadband internet connection across the state. To date, the initiative has “secure[d] mobile hotspots and learning devices for nearly 24,000 students across Maine after schools suspended in-classroom instruction and adopted remote learning earlier this year.”⁹ Additionally, the state department was able to secure “over \$2 million in pilot implementation funding for Maine schools that have created innovative pilot programs as part of the Rethinking Remote Education Ventures (RREV) project.”¹⁰

EXCLUSIVE TO P-12

Maine offers a variety of education options like Charter, Magnet, and Private Non-Sectarian/Sectarian/Special Purpose choices.¹¹ The legislature determined that private schools that enroll 60 percent or more publicly funding students should meet certain requirements.¹²

A recently passed bill directed the state department to report on charter school funding methods and reporting protocols.¹³
